Growth and Decline of American Industry

Ever since Adolph Berle and Gardiner Means wrote their classic 1932 analysis of the American corporation, *The Modern Corporation and Private Property*, social scientists have been intrigued and challenged by the evolution of this crucial part of American social and economic life. Thus, the corporation altered manufacturing entities so that they were each owned by many people instead of by single individuals as had previously been the case.
